A Message from Mrs. Hill

October has been a very busy month here at Davis Elementary! It is hard to believe that a third of the school year has already passed. Our teachers and students have worked so hard this first marking period. It is exciting to visit classrooms each day and watch our students happily engaged in learning. Each day they are striving to become the best "readers, writers, mathematicians and scientists. We honored many of our students for displaying our Guidelines for Success at our first ROAR Rally this past week. I want to thank all of the parents and visitors who attended our Rally to support our outstanding students.

November will be a very busy month on campus. On November 2nd, students will be bringing home orders from the PTA catalog fundraiser. Be on the lookout for these items coming home. On November 12th, all Davis students will be treated to a BMX Bike Show sponsored by our amazing PTA. Mrs. Scott will be organizing our annual book fair the week of November 15th. More information will be coming home in the next week detailing specific dates. You may want to think about picking up a few holiday gifts for the family during book fair week. Another important point I need to bring up to parents is about the district's new attendance policy. I have outlined the policy in this newsletter. Please take time to read it carefully as we will be enforcing and adhering to this policy beginning November 1st. Our biggest challenge here at Davis is students who are tardy in the morning. Please remember that your child is considered tardy if they are not in their classroom at the tardy bell (8:35am). Family vacations, heavy traffic, and oversleeping are considered unexcused tardies/absences. The most crucial learning hours of a school day are the morning hours, because students are most attentive. Students who are tardy miss the beginning of their morning classes, and they also cause a distraction when they arrive late to the classroom. Research shows that students who are frequently tardy have lower GPAs, lower scores on standardized assessments, and lower graduation rates. Chronic tardiness in elementary and middle school is also linked to failure in high school. The classroom experience is

of unique value and cannot be duplicated by make-up work, so please take the time to familiarize yourself with the attendance policy.

ATTENDANCE—IT IS THE LAW

Recently, the School Board of Pinellas County adopted new rules about student attendance. The philosophical basis and purpose of the policy is that —the classroom experience is of unique value and cannot be duplicated by make-up work. We all know that the law states that students have to attend school regularly. Where things get a bit confusing and unclear is when we start thinking about absences, tardies and early sign-outs. The new policy now makes some clear distinctions that we would like you to be aware of:

To be counted as present for the school day, a student must be in attendance for at least one half of the day.

Students must be in school unless the absence, tardy or early sign-out is excused.*

Three (3) unexcused tardies within a grading period count as one unexcused absence.

Three (3) unexcused early sign outs within a grading period will count as one unexcused absence.

- * To be **excused**, an absence, tardy or early sign out must meet one of the following criteria:
- A. The student is ill or injured.
- B. There is major illness in the immediate family (parents, siblings, grandparents living in the home)
- C. There is a death in the immediate family.
- D. The student attends religious instruction or there is a religious holiday in the student's own faith.
- E. The student is required by summons, subpoena or court order to appear in court. Document must be provided to principal.
- F. Special Events. The student must get permission from the principal at least five days prior to the absence.
- G. The student has a scheduled medical or dental appointment.
- H. Students having, or suspected of having a communicable disease or infestation which can be transmitted are to be excluded from school and are not allowed to return to school until they no longer present a health hazard.

We do have a form available in the office to request permission to miss school for a special event. Absence due to illness needs to be called into our absence line 727-725-7972 X 2300.

A pattern of unexcused absences, etc. will be referred to our school's Child Study Team.

Third Grade News

The third grade teachers are excited that their students are ROARing into third grade. They have settled into the school year and are hard working, self-motivated, responsible, and respectful students. In writing, third graders are working hard on adding their vocabulary words into their stories, using dialogue and staying focused on their topic. In math, students just wrapped up addition and subtraction with regrouping and are in the midst of multiplication. Please remember: it is crucial that all third graders are reading at home for 30 minutes a night! Also, check out the learning website www.fcatexplorer.com. Username and password information are in your child's planner. Additionally, since the first round of testing is completed, teachers are working on setting up parent conferences over the next few weeks. Thank you for your continued support.

Fourth Grade News

Fourth Grade is off to a great start this year! The students have just completed Assessment Cycle 1. Students are busy getting down to work in reading and writing. We are studying Life Science at this time. We are also studying the book, <u>A Land Remembered</u> in Social Studies. There is an exciting field trip planned to go along with <u>A Land Remembered</u> on January 14th. This covers Florida History. Greetings Parents

Did you know that today, October 29this the end of the first grading period? The first grading period consisted of 47 exciting and enriched instructional days. A Note from the Clinic

We request that medications be given at home whenever possible; however, if a medication is required during school hours, the following procedure must be observed:

1. Parents must obtain "ADMINISTRATION OF MEDICATION" forms from the school.

Blue form: This form is used for prescription drugs and must be signed by the parent.


Orange form: This form is used for non-prescription drugs (over-the-Counter and alternative/herbal/dietary supplements) and must be signed by the parent and the physician/dentist. If there are any changes in the medication and/or new medication is prescribed a new form must be signed and returned to the school.

- 2. Prescription medication must be delivered in a pharmacy prescription container with current date, dosage, name of drug, specific time of medication to be given at school and student's and physician's names clearly marked. Medication must remain in the container in which it was originally dispensed.
- 3. Over the Counter medications and alternative/ herbal/dietary supplements must be in the original sealed container.
- 4. Medication must be sent to school via parent/guardian. Parents should arrange for a separate supply of medication for school. Medication will **not** be transported between home and school on a daily or weekly basis.
- 5. When accepting medication, school staff must count medication with parent.
- 6. Medications will be stored in a locked cabinet at school and a record kept of administration.
- 7. Liquid medications will be given in a calibrated measurer provided by the parent.
- 8. Parents of a student with a history of severe allergies should contact the school regarding an emergency treatment procedure.

- 9. It is the parent's responsibility to pick up unneeded/unused medication as soon as possible. Any medication remaining at the end of the school year will be destroyed.
- 10. New authorization forms are required each school year. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact the clinic at 725-7972.

New Student Achievement Plan Designed To Help Students Succeed

The mission of the Pinellas County School district is 100% Student Success. All students should have an opportunity to attend a great school and perform well academically. The proposed Student Achievement Plan focuses on creating and supporting learning opportunities and options at all schools that will challenge students and promote academic excellence. It encompasses changes in curriculum, instruction, culture, structure and support. The focus of the Student Achievement Plan is more about creating exciting learning opportunities rather than simply assigning students to schools. Among the changes proposed are:

- Creating a "fundamental like" PreK-8 district a focus on involvement and support for student learning, including student uniforms.
- Creating three "research and development" schools in partnership with local colleges.
- Dividing the county into northern, middle and southern zones to provide equal options for families.
- Establishing an Advanced International Certificated Education (similar to the International Baccalaureate) program at three high schools.
- Adding a third high school IB program in the middle of the county (IB programs are already at Palm Harbor University High and St. Petersburg High).
- Expanding virtual school at all school levels.
- Expanding (Advancement Via Individual Determination) AVID programs at all high and middle schools.
